From the Music Department

For those who haven't met me officially yet, I'm Dan Mikat, the new director of music ministries here at Holy Trinity. It's been many years since I've served in a Lutheran Church and I'm thrilled to be back. My first church job was as organist at St. Timothy's in Kendall, Florida. It was several decades ago, while I was an undergraduate student at University of Miami, when I was offered the job as organist. I informed the pastor and director of music that I was a pianist, not an organist. Their response was "That's OK, if you can play piano, you can play organ." (That's not true!) So I spent a few months figuring out how to play organ without the benefit of lessons or guidance of any kind.

Fast forward to 2010, I started doctoral work on organ performance at University of Michigan, and was gently informed that I was doing everything wrong and we had to start at the beginning. So once again, I had to figure out how to play a pipe organ, but this time, it was with the benefit of a master teacher. As a result, I finally (after several years of hard work) became competent at playing complicated counterpoint music, which was always elusive to me in the decades prior.

The lesson for me here is that my progress and capacity is closely linked to the availability of a teacher that not only understands a perfect process, but knows how I can overcome my weaknesses and mistakes. Our Savior, Jesus Christ, is the ultimate master teacher and provides a path for overcoming whatever weaknesses or errors we have. Hebrews 2:11 "For both he that sanctifieth and they who are sanctified are all of one."

I hope that everyone feels welcome to participate in the music ministry here at Holy Trinity. There are many ways to be part of worship: choir, handbells, instrumentalists, etc. It matters little how refined and trained you may feel today. As long as you are willing to bring whatever you have, and want to make a joyful noise to the Lord, that's enough.

WHY WE GIVE

Sometimes it seems that we talk about giving money to the church too much. Here are some reasons that our people say they financially support Holy Trinity.

MINISTRY: It's about the ministry. Nobody is getting rich working for the church. We are supporting doing God's work, building God's kingdom on earth. If I want a new ministry, I know money will be needed for staff, materials, etc. and I can help.

GRATITUDE: God has been good to me during my life. While I'm not wealthy, I have what I need and there have been times when things could have turned out worse. Often I say, "there by the grace of God go I." I thank God by financially supporting God's work.

GENERATIONS: If we do not teach our children and grandchildren about God and Jesus, who will? I feel that my faith gives me a moral compass. It helps me make decisions and I want that for the next generation. I do not want them to make decisions simply based on what gives them pleasure. And I do not want our culture to be so disorderly that the government has to control people with police, laws, and prisons. Our faith should be able to help us control our own behavior.

COMMUNITY: Holy Trinity helps needy people in the community with food, Christmas gifts, safe water, etc. I know that my donations will be well spent, like a good investment.

FAMILY: We have attended Holy Trinity for many years. We have relationships and care for other people who care about us. We help each other when we have special needs. We pray for one another. We forgive one another more than we would someone we do not know. When I cannot attend church, I feel "off," somehow incomplete. Just being with my church family picks me up.

ENJOYMENT: I enjoy being at church, with the music, the singing and camaraderie. We do stuff that I enjoy. Sometimes it is just pulling weeds or a Christmas cantata.

RESPONSIBILITY: My father taught me, "if it is to be, it must be me." That has worked in my business and family. I feel that responsibility at church as well. If I do not like how the ceiling tiles are stained from a leaky roof, I feel that if I want that changed, I have to do it. Most often we work together as a group, and I feel responsible for contributing as a leader, being a cheerleader or contributing money to help cover the costs.

MORE THAN HABIT: I was raised to put something in the offering plate each week. As a child they gave me coins to put in and as I got older I put in part of my allowance or what I earned mowing lawns. Now as an adult it seems that giving an offering is a natural part of what I do at worship.

GOD TOLD ME TO GIVE: God told Adam and Eve to be good stewards of creation. That means taking care of our planet and all that live on it. Jesus taught us to care for people who are needy, less fortunate, or disabled. God loves a cheerful giver.
